## CLASS 1 • THEY SANG A HYMN

- Mark 14:22-26 (NIV)

- 22) While they were eating, Jesus took bread, gave thanks and broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take it; this is my body."
- 23) Then he took the cup, gave thanks and offered it to them, and they all drank from it.
- 24) "This is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many," he said to them.
- 25) "I tell you the truth, I will not drink again of the fruit of the vine until that day when I drink it anew in the kingdom of God."
- 26) When they had sung a hymn, they went out to the Mount of Olives.

- Scriptural reasons why we sing hymns

- Ephesians 5:19-21: "Speaking to yourselves in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody in your heart to the Lord; Giving thanks always for all things unto God and the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ; Submitting yourselves one to another in the fear of God."
- Colosians 3:12-16: "Put on therefore, as the elect of God, holy and beloved, bowels of mercies, kindness, humbleness of mind, meekness, longsuffering; Forbearing one another, and forgiving one another, if any man have a quarrel against any: even as Christ forgave you, so also do ye. And above all these things put on charity, which is the bond of perfectness. And let the peace of God rule in your hearts, to the which also ye are called in one body; and be ye thankful. Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom; teaching and admonishing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing with grace in your hearts to the Lord."

- Psalm 69:30: “I will praise the name of God with a **song**, and will magnify him with thanksgiving.”
- Psalm 96:1-4: “O sing unto the LORD a new **song**: sing unto the LORD, all the earth. Sing unto the LORD, bless his name; shew forth his salvation from day to day. Declare his glory among the heathen, his wonders among all people. For the LORD is great, and greatly to be praised: he is to be feared above all gods.”
- Psalm 95:1-3 “O come, let us sing unto the LORD: let us make a joyful noise to the rock of our salvation. Let us come before his presence with thanksgiving, and make a joyful noise unto him with psalms. For the LORD *is* a great God, and a great King above all gods.
- Psalm 150:1-6 “Praise ye the LORD. Praise God in his sanctuary: praise him in the firmament of his power. Praise him for his mighty acts: praise him according to his excellent greatness. Praise him with the sound of the trumpet: praise him with the psaltery and harp. Praise him with the timbrel and dance: praise him with stringed instruments and organs. Praise him upon the loud cymbals: praise him upon the high sounding cymbals. Let every thing that hath breath praise the LORD. Praise ye the LORD.
- What a hymn means
  - A hymn is a prayer to God
    - We should treat them as such
    - Sing with feeling and intensity
    - Don't worry about the tune, concentrate on the words
  - A hymn is a way to praise God
    - Offer a sweet-smelling sacrifice unto the Lord
    - Give the BEST to the Lord
    - Concentrate on making the music the best that you can offer
  - Unlike other things we do, a hymn is a combination of these things
    - That is why Hymns are so popular
    - Both the Heart and the Head
- What you should think about when you sing
  - The Words
  - The Music
    - The prayer that you are giving to God

  - Christadelphians
  - Old Marches, etc.
